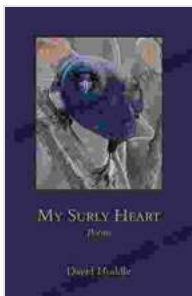


My Surly Heart: Poetic Expressions of Unrequited Love from Southern Messenger Poets

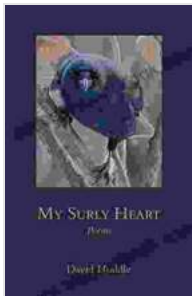
